About us

Grantham College is a small general further education college based on four sites in the town of Grantham.

We offer provision from entry level to higher education in a broad range of subject areas. We are recognised as a good quality provider by Ofsted for all of our provision types and by the Office for Students under their Teaching Excellence Framework for Higher Education for which the college received a Silver Award. We are also financially strong and recognised as having good financial health by the Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA).

The College was established in 1948 and had 48 students on predominately engineering provision. Now, almost 75 years later, the college is supporting closer to 3000 people each year to improve their skills. Engineering provision is still important to us and the local economy and our apprenticeship provision is a key part of what we do. Our other vocational provision also meets local skills needs and those identified by the Greater Lincolnshire Local Enterprise Partnership and include

(although not limited to) Health & Social Care; Business and Management; Construction; Animal Care; Sport; Visual & Performing Arts; Public Services and Computing. In addition, the provision of English and maths to support our students is important to us as is our community provision and the significant work we do on a range of projects to help people back into work or to improve their skills for work.

Rooted in the local community the college has a strong history of partnership working to deliver our mission. We work with a range of partners including employers large and small, local schools, colleges and universities across the region.



The College has developed Higher Education provision in recent years opening a University Centre in Elsham House in 2019 and the Institute of Technology in 2022 in Stonebridge House.

The college is proud to protect these historic assets by bringing them into use to support the next generation acquire the higher level skills needed by the local economy.

The College works in partnership with Bishop Grosseteste University in Lincoln to validate some of its provision and the University of Lincoln and other local colleges as part of the Lincolnshire Institute of Technology. The aim is to offer a high quality, value for money and accessible offer to develop and retain the higher level skills that the local area needs.

The College works with a range of partner organisations to deliver externally funded projects such as Lottery funded projects as well as with a range of employers delivering apprenticeships and bespoke training.

Policy & Economic Context

The College, whilst having a clear mission and vision, operates within a very complex and dynamic environment and this Strategic Plan aims to respond to national government policy as well as local and regional need.

The college has and must continue to adapt to meet the challenges created by the pandemic, climate change, the war in Ukraine, AI & automation, Brexit, devolution, severe skills shortages and new legislation such as the Skills & Post-16 Education Act and associated reforms. Successfully levelling up the UK will require significant and sustained investment in skills, both capital and revenue. Grantham College is investing in both facilities and people and is determined to make Grantham College one of the most exciting and desirable places to work to ensure that we retain and attract the best people and resources to deliver our mission.

We are responding to the above with new provision including T Levels, Skills Bootcamps and Higher Technical Qualifications across a range of sectors, often delivered in newly refurbished facilities with new equipment. Our provision will focus both on immediate and future skills needs to tackle the challenges and opportunities of climate change, AI & automation. We are hopeful that there will be opportunities that arise from the Multiplier and Turing schemes and the UK Shared Prosperity Fund that will support us in delivering our mission as ESF and Erasmus funding has done in recent years.

We will support the work of local Employer Representative Bodies in developing Local Skills Improvement Plans, carefully watch the outputs from the new Future Skills Unit which will look at the data and evidence of where skills gaps do and will exist and in what sectors.

The college continues to receive a significant proportion of its income from central government and has had to adapt to significant real terms cuts to this income over recent years and real terms cuts to funding per student. The college has continued to adapt successfully to changes in government policy and priorities, maintaining high standards whilst remaining a strong and resilient institution.

As ever successful reform of skills will depend on the successful timing and resourcing of new initiatives if they are to truly improve social mobility and solve the skills and productivity gaps that have hindered our businesses and economy. One thing is certain, our mission, vision and values will continue to guide us through the period of change ahead ensuring that we continue to strive to deliver for our students, apprentices, employers and community.

Run more progression & careers events


